known as the "Monitors," in Company K.

On September 8, 1862, at the age of 28, Charles mustered in to service with
the rank of 2nd Lieutenant and was discharged February 7, 1863.

He is buried in Oakland Cemetery, Sag Harbor.

Sag Harbor—Charles P. Cook, aged 84, veteran of the Civil War and of the Edwin Rose Post, G. A. R., passed away at the Gardiner House on Bay street last Thursday. Funeral services were conducted at the home of his nephew, W. M. Cook, on Concord street, last Saturday, with the Rev. J. A. McMillan officiating and interment was in Oakland cemetery.

CHAS. P. COOK DIES

Charles Phillip Cook, eighty-four, one of the oldest native inhabitants of Sag Harbor village and a scion of pioneer stock, died at the Gardiner House, Bay street, Thursday last. Funeral services were held at the home of his nephew, William M. Cook, on Concord street, the Rev. J. A. Macmillan, pastor of the M. E. church, officiating, in absence of any regular pastor of the Presbyterian Society, of which Mr. Cook was a member. Burial was in Oakland cemetery. Mr. Cook was one of a large family of boys and girls, a son of the late Luther D. Cook, whaling agent, owner and outfitter, merchant and historian. His mother was Mary Huntting, who descended from the Hunttings, first settlers of the Hampton towns and initial ship owners who sent vessels on deep sea voyages in pursuit of whales and established at Sag Harbor a great industry.
