On September 8, 1862, at the age of 23, he mustered in with the rank of Private. He mustered out with his company June 30, 1865, at Charleston, S.C.

He is buried in Southampton Cemetery.

George Culver, G. A. R. Veteran, Passes Away.

On Wednesday night, a few hours before the coming of Memorial Day, George Culver, an old resident of this village, and one of Southampton's few veterans of the Civil War, died at his home here, aged 73 years. Death was caused by a napoplectic stroke, a previous seizure a few years ago, having seriously affected his health. He was born in Southampton and came from old Colonial stock. His father was Merritt Culver, of Culver Hill, and his mother was Caroline Marshall. Mr. Culver spent the most of his life in Southampton, where he carried on a wheelwright's business. He enlisted in the Civil War, and served as a private until the close of the war. He is survived by two sons, Arthur and Alfred Culver, and one daughter, Grace. His wife died a number of years ago.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist church, Sunday afternoon, conducted by the Rev. Henry Medd, and were largely attended, delegations from Neptune Council, R. A., and Puritan Council, Jr. O. U. A. M., being present, also fourteen G. A. R. veterans from this and nearby villages. Mrs. Henry Medd sang "One Sweetly Solemn Thought," and Mr. Medd paid an eloquent tribute to the memory of the deceased, who had been a member of that church for thirty-two years and active in its affairs.

There were many beautiful floral pieces from friends and lodges, and the casket was covered with an American flag. The pallbearers were Addison E. Jennings, L. E. Terry, L. F. Jennings, O. C. Gardner, George R. Howell and Charles A. Bennett. The interment was in the Southampton cemetery.
