Abraham De Bevoise.

Abraham De Bevoise died Saturday from complications, at his residence, 376 Halsey street. He was a nephew of Joseph Sprague, who was president of the old village of Breucklin, and for two terms mayor of the City of Brooklyn. He was born on a farm in the old town of Bedford, April 16, 1823, and was the son of James and Ann Vandervoort De Bevoise. Fifteen years ago deceased retired from the general management of the Tirrell Manufacturing Company. He served during the Civil War as captain of Company K. of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh Regiment of New York Volunteers, and was a member of Devin Post of the G. A. R. He was for many years a member of the First Dutch Reformed Church on Joralemon street. Mr. De Bevoise leaves a brother, the Rev. Gabriel De Bevoise, of Walpole, N. H.
