Strong served in the 1st New York Marine Artillery Regiment,
in Company A.

He mustered in to service at the age of 30, with the rank of Private. He was injured during an explosion on the gunboat *Picket*. He was discharged September 24, 1862, at Newbern, N.C., for the injury he sustained.

Strong is buried in the South End Burying Ground, East Hampton.

Chas. H. Strong, of the gunboat Picket, which was blown up off Washington, N. C. a short time since, arrived home on Tuesday for the purpose of recruiting his health.

Wm. H. Collet, a member of the 81st regiment, who was wounded and taken prisoner at the battle of Fair Oaks, arrived here yesterday.

Dr. H. A. Reid, son-in-law of Wm. Lawrence, of this village, was killed in one of the late Maryland battles; also John Simons of the 8th Connecticut, a native of this place.

The names of Wm. Fordred and John D. Gough are to be added to the volunteers for the 81st regiment.

Major Wm. H. Ludlow, of Gen. Dick's Staff, has been promoted to a Lieut-Colonel.
